72 Hours of Prayer—Maida Anderson (C&MA International Worker)

International Worker, Maida Anderson attends a small Alliance church on the outskirts of Madrid, Spain. Carlos, a man in their congregation, was stricken with COVID-19 and ended up in ICU.

In late April, the doctors called Carlo's wife to say that they didn't think he would make it through the night. She called on the church to pray and they opened a 24-hour prayer room on Zoom. There was someone in that room praying non-stop for the first seventy-two hours and then intermittently for the next five weeks. Carlos made it through that crisis and slowly

recovered. He was released from the hospital on May 27th!

He still has a long road to complete recovery, so the church continues to pray. Pray for Carlos and other victims of COVID-19, as well as for the families of those who did not recover. Pray also that Carlos will have a powerful testimony of God's care, and that people in Spain and around the world, will see their need for Jesus in these tumultuous days.

Because salvation is found in no one else.

C&MA Missionary—Anne Louie

Anne Louie was born in Hong Kong. She is the sixth child of seven children. She accepted Jesus as her Saviour when she was in junior high and loves to share the Good News to others because of the new life that God gave her. She received the calling from God when she attended Urbana 96. Anne moved to Toronto, Ontario in 1992. After served in Cornerstone Chinese Alliance Church as Associate Pastor for Mandarin Ministry, she served with the C&MA in Canada as a missionary appren-

tice from 2006-2008, and as an international worker in Amsterdam from 2008 to 2012 for church-planting among Mandarin speaking Chinese. After completion of language study from 2013-2014, she served in El Salvador from 2014-2017 for church-planting among the



Chinese diaspora. After a year of home assignment, she went to Mexico City in July 2018 to serve Chinese Professionals (Mandarin-speaking) in Mexico City with Rev. & Mrs. Victor & Betty Chin.

Anne is teaching basic Spanish class every Wednesday morning and leading Women's Bible study group every Thursday morning. Anne will also share occasionally during Sunday service. Anne is connecting with more Chinese Professionals in Mexico City and is involved visitation, evangelism, and discipleship.

Update from WCAC Epidemic Response Team

As the Government gradually reopen. Church is planning to re-open in stages as well. Currently Mandarin is in stage zero. This means that we have started online live stream service in order to train service team for readiness. Once we move into stage one, the following is what you can expect when physically attending church service.

1. At stage one, limited number of members can attend the physical service. Senior and family with young children should stay home attending live stream service .
2. You will need to go online or

call a administrator to pre-register the night before service.

3. Before you leave your house Sunday morning, fill a paper form Health survey, if you check any "yes" on the survey, please stay home that day. You will need to print your name and drop the survey in a box at the entrance for contact tracking purpose.
4. Follow pre-marked direction for social distancing.
5. There will be temperature check at the door.
6. Wear mask all the time inside church building.

7. Dry wash hands before entering buildings

8. Avoid touch any surfaces (chair, guard reel, door handles.)

9. Bring your own bible to service, no sharing of bibles or hymn books

10. Do not dispose used masks and gloves in church. You should bring your own zip lock bag to collect the used masks and gloves and bring it home after service.

For the safety of members and the community, we need to adopt the new normal.
